p. 60: Table 9. The figures for Cuba, which are taken from "Direction of Trade", differ from those published in the country's official statistical bulletin for 1970. The official figures are as follows:

p. 74: Table 4 and p. 76: Table 6. The revision of the value of the exports of Cuba in 1970 and 1971 and of Chile in 1971 changes those countries' position in the columns corresponding to the years in question. The revised figures are as follows:

Cuba: in 1970, increase of 57.3 per cent  
in 1971, decrease of 17.6 per cent

Chile: in 1971, decrease of 23.2 per cent

The total for the 24 countries is therefore:

1970 13.6 per cent  
1971 0.1 per cent
