SUMMARY OF ISSUES AND PROBLEMS IN THE CARIBBEAN

I Present Framework

- physical characteristics: small size, resource base;
- geographical situation: strategic location, external involvement;
- legacy of colonialism;
- differences in constitutional, political, economic,
 linguistic and cultural situation;
- absence of significant inter-country linkages
 but presence of metropolitan linkages;
- weak institutional structure in society;
- inadequate infrastructural facilities to support development efforts;
- high degree of import/export dependence;
- undiversified economic structures;
- content and orientation of education system.

II Issues and Problems

- maintenance of social and political stability;
- diseconomies of small scale in administration, production, services;
- weakly integrated economy;
- better mobilisation of domestic resources;
- devising and enforcing prices' and incomes' policy, industrial discipline, productivity;
- concentrated economic development on selective basis vs. mass limited improvement;
- diagnosing and tackling root problem of poverty;
- education and integration of women in development;
- migration policy: brain drain, optimum use of remittances:
- gap between administration and general public;
- communal responsibility especially for communal services;
- closed economy vs. open economy;
- endogenous development of social sciences to enable each society to elucidate its own problems;
- structural changes in the economy to obviate dependence of external capital flows for development;
- national economic management:
- new and renewable sources of energy.
